The hike was led by Ranger Dan Small who, with 23 years of experience in his role, shared a breadth of information about the ecology of Lynn Woods and its most curious history. (Have you heard of the buried treasure at Dungeon Rock?) Attendees had a chance to check out the view from the top of Stone Tower, the highest point in Lynn. At 2,200 acres, Lynn Woods is the second largest municipal park in the United States. Greenbelt has worked for many years with the City of Lynn, local residents, and the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation to permanently protect Lynn Woods. We're making exciting progress towards this important goal!

Two Osprey chicks in Essex

Success, and Questions, this Osprey Season

The Osprey nesting season is winding down. Many successful pairs have already fledged their chicks, while others are still busy tending to their little ones who have not yet left the nest. It takes approximately 45-50 days for an Osprey chick to attain flight and become a fledgling. That is a lot of work for mom and dad!

Preliminary data suggests that we will see an increase in nesting pairs in our region in 2023: there are probably close to 80 pairs compared to 75 pairs in 2022, and we hope to band 40- 50 chicks this season. Sadly, it appears that some chicks are not surviving this year due to malnutrition, a result of the adults not being able to provide enough fish for their young. This is a widespread issue in 2023 without an easy explanation—weather? lack of fish? At this point, we still don't know. This fall we will have a full summary of the 2023 nesting season to share.
