### It's that Time of Year... the OspreyCam is Back!

Tune-in to see one of our favorite Osprey pairs, Annie and Squam, as they return from their southern wintering grounds to their summer home on the Greenbelt saltmarsh in Gloucester. The OspreyCam offers live-feed of their nest which is located near Lobstaland Restaurant. Annie and Squam will spend April through August nesting and, hopefully, raising their fifth set of chicks. They are one of the 75 reported breeding pairs in Northeastern Massachusetts in 2022, a dramatic and celebrated increase from just one known breeding pair in 1985.

We are saddened by the passing of Preston Rogers. The land we now call Artichoke River Woods in West Newbury was purchased from Preston and his wife, Debora in 2021.
